From The Interim Rector

Giving Thanks

They are among the first words and actions that we teach our children as they learn to interact with other people in the world. The first is to say "please." The second is to say "thank you." In my family, the conversation with our two-year-old grandson goes something like this: "I want some milk." "What do you say?" "Please." And then: "What do you say?" "Thank you."

Learning to say please and especially thank you is not just an important thing for children to learn. It is important for grown-ups, too. It acknowledges the person from whom the gift, in whatever form it takes, comes, and it acknowledges that that gift, whether a cup of milk or a new car, is just that – a gift. It is not a wage. There was nothing done to earn or deserve it. And equally importantly, it is not an entitlement. It does not belong to us just because we are special.

It is human nature, I think, to sometimes forget that gifts are gifts and not something else. Moses seemed to understand that. Just after he describes to the people the promised land they are about to enter, he warns them not to forget the lessons they learned in the wilderness, and their dependence upon God's mercy and sustenance. "When you have eaten your fill and have built fine houses and live in them, and when your herds and flocks have multiplied, and your silver and gold is multiplied, then do not exalt yourself, forgetting the Lord your God," he says. "Do not say to yourself, 'My power and the might of my own hand have gotten me this wealth..." In other words, "Don't be thinking that this was your doing."

Perhaps that is one of the reasons why, week after week, we come together to say thank you, why we gather around the table at the Great Thanksgiving – not because it is the polite thing to do, but because it acknowledges and reminds us that our salvation comes by way of grace. It is not an entitlement or a reward. It is all a gift from God for which we are truly grateful.

It is also good, from time to time, to acknowledge and say thank you for some of the smaller things, the other gifts God has given, the other blessings that we have received. And so, we have come to set aside the fourth Thursday each November to do just that. Thanksgiving is a time for acknowledging and thinking about the things in life which we have been given. It is also a chance to consider the ways in which God has sustained us in the wilderness, the difficult and challenging times, and to say thank you for that, too.

It is too bad, really, that we set aside only one day a year to be intentional about giving thanks, or about being thankful. Because to intentionally make ourselves aware each day what God has provided, how God is active and

Our second session, November 8 from 7-8:30 pm via Zoom, will be a forum for reflecting on next steps in terms of study and action. We will take inspiration from materials and examples offered by the updated Sacred Ground curriculum as well as experiences shared by participants.

Updated COVID Protocols for Worship

In keeping with recent changes in Diocesan health and safety guidelines with respect to COVID 19, we will no longer be requiring people to wear masks indoors at church. Rector Search Committee Update

On October 7th our call for a new Rector for St. Anselm's was posted nationally, through the Diocese. We also posted our Parish Profile and OTM Ministry Portfolio on our website: www.stanselms.us. Please visit the website to see what we posted under the "Link to Application Materials" tab on the front page.

The committee thanks the 75 parishioners who participated in our Listening Sessions and/or gave us input via email or in writing. The information we received was used to define who we are as a parish/community and what qualities we are looking for in our next Rector. This information was in turn used to create our Parish Profile and our OTM Ministry Portfolio.

Our next step is to wait for the applications to be submitted. Our posting will be open until November 5th. At that time our committee will begin reviewing the applications, resume submissions, interviewing, and getting to know the applicants. This is a highly confidential period, and we will not be sharing any information with anyone outside of the committee during this time. When our committee has completed the interview process for each of the applicants, we will send our recommendations to the Vestry for final review, further interviews, and approval. They will make the final decision of who will be our next Rector.

If all goes according to this plan, we will be announcing the name our new Rector in the first quarter of the New Year!

Stewardship 2023

It's hard to believe that Marian and I have been part of the St. Anselm's community for more than 20 years. As I have taken up the role of Treasurer and member of the Stewardship Committee, I find myself thinking of the other times I've called on our congregation's generosity. Whether for the youth group (who remembers the God Squad and the mission trips that many of our children took, performing hurricane relief and other good works?), for the Harvest Festival, or for other Trinity Center fundraisers, I always characterized those appeals as the easiest jobs at St. Anselm's – because the congregation is always so generous and so willing to help others.

As we approach the conclusion of our 2023 Stewardship Campaign, it's time for us to help ourselves as well. As Paul Witkay pointed out in his Stewardship letter, sent this week, the pandemic and demographics have led to a decline in pledges, and it's time for all of us to do what we can to make up the resulting significant gap in our budget.

I'm just so amazed at the stories we heard from our three Stewardship speakers over the past month. Peggy, Katie, and Sylvia all kept it simple and personal. We got to hear their stories of how they came to St. Anselm's – 30 years ago or two, alone or as a family – and heartfelt descriptions of what St. Anselm's means to each of them. We have built and are building something wonderful here, and it's great to hear the stories so well told by folks who are part of that building.

Paul is right – this is a challenging year for St. Anselm's. It's time to think, to understand, to pray on what St. Anselm's means to each of us and what we're able to do in our pledges this year. If we all keep doing what we're doing – we'll come up 30% short. Of course we are reaching out to past members and non-pledging members to see what they can add, and we have reserves to keep the essentials in place for now – but each increased pledge means a lot this year. The combination of these heartfelt stories and financial commitments will be powerfully persuasive to any potential new rector seeking a home in our wonderful community.

One more observation and some logistics: Loyalty Sunday usually includes a breakfast prepared by the Stewardship committee; I think it's just totally in character for this congregation that we're postponing that breakfast for a week to accommodate our participation in the Winter Nights program.

So just to be clear:

Loyalty Sunday is November 6th – please bring your pledge to church that day if you can attend in person, or mail it to the office by that date.

Stewardship Breakfast is the following week, on November 13th - please bring your appetite to church that day, we have not figured out how to prepare eggs via Zoom, so we hope you're all able to join us.

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WINTER NIGHTS 2022 (AND 2016)

As most of you probably already know, we are currently hosting three homeless families in Jackson Hall through the Winter Nights program. They arrived on Monday, October 4th and will be with us until Monday morning, Nov.mber 7th. The first week our partner church, The Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints of San Ramon, has been providing the meals. We took over the meals on Monday, October 31st.

I have a wonderful Winter Nights story to share with you. I've been going over to Jackson Hall every morning and evening, just so there's a St. Anselm's presence there and in case our partners have questions. Towards the end of the week, I went into the library in Jackson Hall where the onsite Winter Nights staff member was sitting in front of her computer. I wanted say "Hello" and introduce myself. Before I could, she said, "Hello. You're Anne, right?" Inwardly I had a moment of panic, saying to myself, "Oh no! She must have been here earlier in the week, and I've forgotten! Dementia has set in!" Then she said, "My three kids and I were housed here in 2016." She went on to tell me that she now works for Winter Nights as their Site Supervisor. She rents a home with help through Section B, and has a car. Her oldest is now a junior in high school, her middle one is in 7th grade, and her youngest is in 2nd grade.

Taking out her phone, she proceeded to show me 2016 photos of her daughter, then age 6, in the playground at St. Anselm's and also in our courtyard. She also showed a photo of herself, taken then. I immediately recognized her. She said that she remembers how kind and caring we all were in that difficult time of her life and what a difference that made.

I was blown away. I'm used to being thanked by families on site, but to be thanked six years later and shown pictures from that time seemed to me to take gratitude to a whole new level.

I don't usually look forward to writing something for *Canterbury Tales* but did this time. I believe that most, if not all of us, are 100% behind our support of Winter Nights. It does involve some work and inconvenience, though. We give up Jackson Hall for 2 weeks, not so important in these COVID times, but previously it affected coffee hour, yoga, and anything else we used the hall for. We have extra jobs to do - unloading the tents from the truck and loading them up again at the end, bringing meals, getting up before dawn to put out the breakfast, dealing with the inevitable plumbing issues that come up, and on and on. I hope that the former guest's expression of gratitude is, for you, as for me, an affirmation that we really are making a difference and that we are appreciated and truly acknowledged for that.

Eva has done an amazing job of receiving offers of assistance and creating a schedule for meal volunteers, doing shopping for supplies, and in general inspiring us all to contribute. This is happening this year while she is working at Grace Cathedral for the diocese and Bishop Marc in what sounds to be a challenging and time-consuming job.

I want to thank Doug Merrill, who, along with Jon Martin, got the outside lights to work so that guests and volunteers wouldn't have to walk across the parking lot in the dark. Doug is also now dealing with some plumbing/toilet issues in Jackson Hall. He is our go-to person when something goes wrong. We call him and he comes right over.


I want to thank and acknowledge Chris Young, who stepped up and cleaned up when I used the wrong soap in the dishwasher, and there were suds all over the place.
