From The Rector


I am very grateful to join you in mutual ministry as your rector. I confess that I have trouble with that title because it derives from the Latin word "regere," which means "to rule." I prefer the language that was used at my ordination: I am very grateful to join you in mutual ministry as your "priest, pastor, and teacher" (who also is a student).

A couple of decades ago, a (Roman Catholic) priest told me that, no matter where we find ourselves, no matter how long we're there, we're only just visiting. When I left St. John the Evangelist to join you, I left them with that message. I have often thought of that while leaving a place, when my "visit" was concluding. But it came to mind when I joined you, too. I think, having seen the (amazing!) parish timeline in Jackson Hall, it made me reflect again that, no matter how permanent our tenures may seem, each one of us is visiting St. Anselm's – each of your rectors included. Each one of us is a guest in this community, a community that, with God's help (and with your help), will continue long after our leaving.

All of this stirred in me a desire to extend an invitation to you. As we continue to make this our community of faith and parish home, as we grow settled into our ministries and offices, as we sink roots into our neighborhood, what does it also mean to embrace being a visitor here? What are we being invited to do for the care of this place and the people here during our visit? How might God be inviting us to consider how to support St. Anselm's to ensure those who visit after us will be welcomed into a loving, vibrant, and healthy community of faith? What might we do to ensure St. Anselm's remains an integral part of this community well into the future?

Our participation in the three-year Vital + Thriving program will help us discern, with God's help, the answers to some of these questions. I am excited about this program, and all the other ways in the short term that we will seek to engage and contribute to the life of our neighborhood. Thank you all for your generous and loving contributions to the life, ministry, and mission of our parish!

Vestry Meeting Update


At the July 17th Vestry meeting our primary discussion items included:
