From The Rector

Between September 1st and October 4th, the Episcopal Church will join other churches globally to observe the Season of Creation. According to Rev. Dr. Cynthia Moe-Lobeda, of the Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary, in Berkeley, "The Season of Creation is the annual Christian celebration to pray and respond together to the cry of Creation: the ecumenical family around the world unites to listen and care for our common home."

Observing the Season of Creation means to reflect with gratitude on all of the ways that God has generously given to us through the richness of Creation – a Creation of which we are a part. Our planet Earth, our island home, is God's generous gift that we inherit from generation to generation – a gift we are called to steward for the common good of all. The Senior Warden

By the time you read this, we will be into or through two new improvements to our campus. Chris Young and I have been exploring two areas of needed improvements. First, we finalized an agreement for roof repairs which the Vestry has approved. Second, with Vestry agreement, we are removing approximately 13 trees, mostly pines, from our property. The tree removal will eliminate the daily mess that falling pine needles make. More importantly, it will result in improved fire safety for our campus. This work will be completed within the next few weeks and is the last of the major maintenance projects that have been delayed for several years.

While campus improvements have required spending some reserves, we budget about \$40k a year for maintenance, so we do not anticipate the need to spend reserves on maintenance issues over the next several years, but rather to pay for such needs out of annually budgeted monies. The one major unknown is whether or not we can achieve a balanced budget and, if so, when? Any amounts that are not funded by budgeted revenue, will need to be funded by reserves. This year, we expect to have a budget deficit in the range of \$43,000 which will need to be paid from reserves. This is our operational budget deficit; it does not account for the parking lot project, which was paid entirely from reserves. As we approach Stewardship in October, please keep our current revenue shortfall in mind. Our goal over the next several years is to achieve revenue growth that exceeds annual expenses, and that will require both the addition of new pledging units as well as increased commitments from our current members.

We have lots of great services and events lining up, so please keep these dates in mind:

- Sunday, October 1 Feast of St. Michael honoring our community first responders
- Sunday, October 8 Blessing of the Animals
- Monday, October 9 to 23 Winter Nights
- Saturday, October 28 First Responder Safety Fair
- Sunday, October 29 Stewardship Pancake Breakfast
- Saturday, November 11 The Harvest Festival

It's a wonderful time of year at St. Anselm's and many ways to celebrate our warm and wonderful community of faith.

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SUNDAY MORNING SERVICE TIME CHANGE

After much discussion, and at the urging of many of our congregation, Stephen+ proposed and the Vestry approved moving St. Anselm's Sunday morning worship service, from 9 a.m., to 10 a.m., beginning Sunday, October 1, 2023, and continuing thereafter. This decision was made after a great deal of prior discussion with many congregation members and ministries, and after Stephen+ reviewed worship service options offered by every other Episcopal Church in Contra Costa County, and worship times offered by several neighboring churches of different denominations. It is important to note that the general feeling in favor of the later start date was to seek to accommodate the expressed needs of families with children, as well as the expressed needs of many of our older members that have difficulty making it to church by 9 a.m. This change also directly responds to the results of the small group discussions, which expressed an interest in bringing in more families and younger parishioners.

We also acknowledge that there are several other members, mostly those who previously attended the 8 a.m. service that had been offered before COVID, who expressed concerns about moving the service later to 10 a.m. These members expressed the desire to have a spoken, faster service that includes Eucharist. We also are mindful that some families, college students, and others have varied schedules that pull them in a variety of directions, including on Sunday mornings. Worship needs to be offered at alternative times, and in alternative formats, to reach people with busy lives and multiple competing commitments. Other worship options and offerings were considered and discussed by the Vestry and Stephen+, and we expect that our worship options will expand in the near- and long-


ANNOUNCING HARVEST FESTIVAL 2023

Put November 11, 2023, on your calendar for a return of the Harvest Festival dinner and fundraiser to benefit our friends at Trinity Center. Our last live Harvest Festival event was way back in 2019, and our newer members have probably never even heard of the event. Our commitment to Trinity Center and its "clients" without a home goes back to 2014, when Trinity Center got started. Today, and with our annual support as help, Trinity Center of Walnut Creek serves as many as 80 "clients a day." It's a place they can gather with a roof over their heads, enjoy breakfast and lunch, meet friends, socialize, wash their clothes, take a shower and seek counseling. In the wet, cold months, Trinity Center, in cooperation with the Walnut Creek City Council and the Armory, provides nightly shelter. We helped create this winter shelter program in 2016 with a generous contribution of over \$54,000, and we have helped ever since.

Our plans for November 11th are now underway. Now is the time to reserve your place at the table. The cost is \$50 per person, with children 12 and under at \$25 per person. We'll get started at 5 p.m. with a "social hour," followed by dinner and a fun filled auction. This is your chance to socialize with friends while your generosity will help the less fortunate in our community.
