CHRISTIAN FORMATION COMMISSION LENTEN SERIES

BUILDING COMMUNITY IN TIMES OF CHANGE

This will be an in-person Speaker Series held on Sundays after church. Following a light lunch, these sessions will begin at 11:30 a.m. and conclude by 12:45p.m. Speakers will offer insights and inspiration about building and healing community. Some involve particular populations, others focus on current issues, but all will offer food for thought and opportunities for discussion. All are welcome to attend some or all of the sessions:

March 3: Cynthia Cudaback, Ph.D., an educator, geophysicist and leader of her congregation's Interfaith Power & Light "Green Team," will discuss science-based solutions to climate change and ways our faith community can make a difference, beyond the greening of our campus.

March 10: John Nickerson, Superintendent of Acalanes Union High School District, will discuss how our local high schools support students with today's unique challenges and opportunities.

March 17: Suzy Pak, Community Outreach Coordinator of Lamorinda Village, will discuss the original social network, its health benefits, and how to find and cultivate your very own.



March 3: Cynthia Cudaback, Ph.D., an educator, geophysicist and leader of her congregation's Interfaith Power & Light "Green Team" - Cynthia is an Oakland native, who has earned degrees in physics and geophysics, operated research vessels, conducted oceanographic research and taught every level from pre-K through graduate school. Her personal mission is to provide people with the tools needed to make informed decisions that affect our environment. This mission informs her teaching, and has inspired her to lead the Earth Care team at her church, as well as volunteering with Interfaith Power and Light. Cynthia is also a professional storyteller, and blends myths with science to teach about the ocean.

March 10: John Nickerson, Ed.D., Superintendent of Acalanes Union High School District - John has served as Superintendent of the Acalanes Union High School District since 2011 and previously held teaching and administrative roles at Miramonte, Acalanes and Campolindo High Schools. As Superintendent of the 5500-student high school district he leads efforts to further develop and implement high quality programs and educational opportunities for students to attain college and career readiness; develop programs and opportunities to promote access and achievement for all students in relevant and engaging curriculum and programs; provide safe, engaging and inclusive school sites and classrooms that address the social-emotional needs of all students; and recruit, develop and retain high quality certificated, classified and administrative staff.





March 17: Suzy Pak, Community Outreach Coordinator of Lamorinda Village - Suzy grew up on California's Central Coast where her parents instilled a strong commitment to community service. At UC Santa Cruz, she was a founding member of Alpha Phi Omega (a service fraternity) and received the JC Penney Golden Rule award for outstanding community service. After earning a B.A., Economics, she worked in fundraising for United Way and as activity director for a senior community. Suzy worked in financial services for 25+ years before retiring in 2019. Suzy has served on several boards including Lafayette Library & Learning Center Foundation, Lafayette School District Governing Board, National Charity League-Acalanes Chapter, Contra Costa Child Abuse Prevention Council, San Francisco Child Abuse Prevention Center, Junior League of San Francisco, Lamorinda Village, and Educate Our State. She was honored with the Junior League's lifetime achievement award and was named Lamorinda Village Volunteer of the Year in 2021. Lamorinda Village is a non-profit 501 c3, membership organization of people over 55 living in

Lafayette, Moraga, and Orinda. Its purpose is to provide support and connections that will help seniors remain in their homes while they age through programs, activities, and volunteer opportunities.

Sukey Bryan a San Francisco Bay Area artist who creates work concerning the cycles of nature in paintings, prints and large-scale installations has loaned St. Anselm's two hand painted banners for use in our sanctuary through the month of March. A recipient of a fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts, Bryan was artist in residence in <u>Denali National Park</u>, Alaska, Grace Cathedral, San Francisco and Chargepoint Headquarters.

Bryan's work has been exhibited widely in the U.S. at galleries, colleges and non-profit art spaces and internationally through the State Department Art in the Embassies program. Her work is held in many private and corporate collections.
