- Greater clarity about the path by which we will discern next steps with Rev. Will; and
- An organized effort to reach out to people we haven't seen in a while to invite input about how they want to stay connected to St. Anselm's.

All that is in addition to ongoing worship, study, connecting and praying that are hallmarks of St. Anselm's – and it's all happened over the summer, when many of us have been fortunate to spend some time traveling and enjoying a change of pace.

In September and beyond, there is much more to look forward to:

- Welcome Sunday, September 8, when we'll be invited to consider new ways to serve and participate within our community;
- A thoughtful process for listening to one another, discerning where we are as a church community and envisioning where we want to go;
- Our Fall stewardship campaign, through which we will be able to get to know one another a bit better in small group settings and consider how we might commit and contribute to our shared future; and
- Several opportunities to engage with the broader community, including Safety Day on September 14 and Winter Nights beginning September 30.

As ever, I am grateful to be part of the vibrant, evolving community that is St. Anselm's.

After 10 years with its base of activity at St. Anselm's and over \$500,000 raised to support the work of Trinity center, the 2024 Harvest Festival Dinner & Auction will be celebrated at Trinity Center in Walnut Creek on November 16. The goal in making this shift is to expand beyond a faith-based organization at St. Anselm's to broaden community support for the wonderful organization our gifts helped launch. TC hopes to gain support not only from other faith-based organizations, but service clubs, city governments, local businesses and concerned individuals that hope to reduce the impact of people without homes within the greater Walnut Creek community.

Luckily, the property commission found a new spark of wizardry by collecting, organizing, and tackling our task list. Thanks to the contributions of those who have long managed property projects, plus our many July work party volunteers, we've made what feels like magical progress.

Hopefully you've noticed the many spring and summer accomplishments, like ... the sanctuary roof repair, benches and windows painted, weeds wacked, flowers planted, window screens replaced, windows washed inside and out, ceilings and walls cleaned and dusted, grounds power-washed, irrigation leaks fixed, security camera batteries replaced, and ohso much more!

In August we completed the annual Fire Safety inspection with a review of many more items including inspecting 10 fire extinguishers in church and pre-school, replacing exit sign and smoke alarm batteries in church and pre-school, and ensuring the kitchen door is properly operational in an emergency.

While we are proud of our accomplishments, we have many more items in our sights. Stephen Ministry has been busy the few of months reviewing a book called The Gift of Empathy. Reading the book has been part of our continuing education in how to serve those in the church and in the community when we provide care. Stephen Ministers are trained to walk with people that are going through difficult times in their life providing confidential one on one care to those in our church and people in the wider community. We attend regular continuing education sessions on various topics throughout the year to grow our skills and identify resources that may help those going through a change of life, like transitioning to Assisted Living, or a crisis like a serious illness or death of someone dear to them.

In May one of our group completed Stephen Leader training so we are planning a commissioning ceremony for two of our Stephen Leaders in the Fall. The Stephen Leaders focus on the administration of our church's Stephen Ministry. Some of the things they do include spreading the word about the ministry, serving as the contact point for people that request care for themselves or others, and identifying and training new candidates for Stephen Ministry. Our Stephen Leaders are also working with the other churches in our consortium to plan the next training series for new Stephen Ministers which will start in the Fall. All the churches in our consortium help provide training to Stephen Ministry candidates including those that come from our St. Anselm's community. The training includes 50 hours of in-person and Zoombased sessions over several months to teach new Stephen Ministers how to provide one on one care to those in need. 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
meeting a new church family at St. Anselm's!


