
As part of the liturgy on March 1st I will offer the following prayer:

From The Senior Warden


This will be my last column as your Senior Warden. It has been a whirlwind ten-month period, but I have seen great progress on many fronts and believe that the coming year will bring many exciting opportunities for growth and continued revival. It has been an honor to serve as your Senior Warden and to get to know my fellow vestry members, our remarkable clergy, and parishioners in deeper ways.

I want to offer a few highlights of the accomplishments of the past year:

- We welcomed Rev. Will, engaged in a process of mutual discernment, and called him to be our full-time rector.
- We navigated transitions in administrative staff (Office Manager, two changes in Bookkeeper) and continued to refine and improve business processes.
- Committee and commission processes continued and/or were newly invigorated as we conducted an impressive array of activities that contributed to community life and the upkeep of our sacred spaces.
- We conducted a successful annual stewardship campaign, raised funds for special needs, and laid the foundation for a long-term endowment.
- We identified and engaged a new Director of Music.

Those are all signs of rather mundane aspects of organizational health (which over this past year I've come to understand and appreciate in entirely new ways!). Equally or more important, St. Anselm's has offered deeply meaningful opportunities for worship and reflection throughout the liturgical seasons. We have seen rising participation in worship as well as virtually all areas of parish life.

I'll save the remainder of my narrative effort for written and oral reports at our upcoming annual meeting, February 9 after church. Please do your best to participate, either in person or via Zoom. At that meeting we will hear important updates from St. Anselm's leaders, elect new vestry members and Deanery representatives, and conduct the church's business. I hope you will join me in celebrating our recent past and looking with anticipation to the year ahead.



The St. Anselm's Vestry met twice in January, in person on January 12 and briefly via Zoom on January 27.

At the first meeting, we discussed plans for Rev. Will's Celebration of New Ministry which will be on Saturday, March 1st at 11 a.m.; Bishop Rios and other guests will attend. In the context of planning for our February 9 annual congregational meeting and year-end reporting, we discussed nominations for the incoming vestry class and a transition in the role of treasurer. We shared updates from various committees and exchanged information about upcoming events.

At the January 27 virtual meeting, the vestry reviewed and approved year-end financial results, which will be shared at the February 9 congregational meeting.

Guest Preacher on March 1st

The Rev. Mary Haddad, born and raised in Canada, engaged in many professions before going to work for the church in 1992. She was a radio show producer, TV production assistant for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, publicist and concert manager for a university School of Music, owner and operator of a French café, and was even a Toyota car salesperson of the year—in Detroit, of all places!

She ventured into church work when she was hired as sexton and verger at an Episcopal church in Los Angeles, where she spent five years before being sent off to General Theological Seminary in New York, graduating and then ordained in 2000.

She subsequently served as senior associate at St. Bartholomew's Church in New York, Canon Pastor at Grace Cathedral in San Francisco, Interim Rector at All Saints' Beverly Hills and frequent teacher and preacher on Hawaii's Big Island and Maui. In her last full-time post, she served as Cathedral Canon at the American Cathedral in Paris, France where she oversaw the creation of a meditation community. She has co-led annual meditation and yoga retreats to Greece since 2018.

In 2022, Mary retired from full-time work taking her passions beyond the walls, leading meditation pop-ups on zoom, becoming a spiritual life coach and conseillère de vie. She continues to stay connected with the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe, serving on the mission team for St. Nino's in Tbilisi, Georgia. After taking a trip around the a world to mark a milestone birthday, a highlight of 2024 (and her life!) was being chosen as a volunteer for the Summer Olympics in Paris. Mary is a French resident and has made Paris her home.

I am so excited to see St Anselm's beginning to grow. I am thrilled by the appointment of Will as our Rector. I would like to see St Anselm's become a place where people are welcomed and feel part of the community not just at coffee hour but in all aspects of church life. St. Anselm's Lafayette Endowment Launched with the Episcopal Church Foundation By John Powers

More exciting news for Year 65 at St. Anselms. Based on the best practices of other long-lived Episcopal parishes, the vestry has decided to establish the St. Anselms Lafayette Endowment. This endowment will invest funds to support the long-term continuity of the parish. In particular, the income from this endowment will be used to support music, education, and the upkeep of sacred spaces at St. Anselms. The endowment will be overseen by a committee composed of John Powers, Keith Pearce, and Iris Hillman. After a review of the parish balance sheet, the vestry has elected to begin funding this endowment with an initial deposit of \$32,500 from memorial accounts.

A huge thank you goes out to all the St. Anselms members who have made gifts in memorial or in honor, or have included St. Anselms in their wills. These gifts from parishioners past and present have enabled this initial funding. Funds for the St. Anselms Lafayette Endowment will be managed by the Episcopal Church Foundation, which manages such endowments for hundreds of Episcopal churches, dioceses, schools, and church-related organizations. A long-term focus allows the endowment to invest in longer-term assets than those on the parish balance sheet - a strategy that over the long run usually yields a higher return than our current investments in bank accounts or certificates of deposit.



Saturday, January 25, ten Stephen Minister trainees from four congregations came together in our parish hall to complete their final lessons and celebrate their graduation in the sanctuary. Will+ spoke briefly of our church's 65 year history and concluded with a send-off prayer. Greg Heiman was one of the ten and now joins us as our newest Stephen minister. St Anselm's is proud to have served our congregation with caring Stephen Ministers for 25 years, longer than any other congregation in the area. Because it is a confidential ministry of listening, understanding and devoted care, you are likely totally unaware that it is working among you. A Stephen Minister can walk beside a care receiver for up to a year, depending on the personal impact of a loss. The loss may result in grief over the death of a loved one, a job, divorce, an illness.... It is proven that we deal much better with what life hands us with a Stephen Minister at our side. Let us walk with you.


