Dear St. Anselm's,

With a special anniversary celebration just around the corner, it's a good time to recall our church's history. Sixty-five years ago this month, St. Anselm's was dedicated by the Right Reverend James Pike, joined by the Rev. Clarence Stacy, our founding vicar, who had previously founded St. Aidan's, San Francisco, and an overflow crowd of people. One local paper proclaimed St. Anselm's "the fastest growing Episcopal church in the United States." In the years that followed, our little brown church in Burton Valley has provided inspiration, community, and innumerable opportunities to serve.

The Rev. Stanley Smith soon followed our founding vicar in 1961. Smith was connected with our architectural sibling on Cape Cod, the Chapel of St. James the Fisherman in Wellfleet, also designed by noted Finnish architect Olav Hammarstrom. (We will welcome Smith's children, who have fond memories of their years in Lafayette, at our October 26th celebration.) In 1965, St. Anselm's welcomed George Hunt as Vicar, who was elected Bishop of Rhode Island in 1980 and was a leader in the movement for LGBTQ inclusion in the church. Hunt was followed by James Jones, who went on to teach for two decades at Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley.

Thanks to the steadfast leadership of the Rev. Bob Tsu from 1972 to 1985, St. Anselm's became a parish and was involved in supporting refugees and the founding of East Bay Hospice. The Revs. Charles Ramsden and Bob Moore each served as Rector for 5 years. During the Rev. John Sutton's 23 years as Rector, St. Anselm's experienced significant physical plant improvements, the establishment of Michael Lane Preschool, and provided generous support for Trinity Center in Walnut Creek, a respite and community center for the homeless and working poor.

A church like St. Anselm's is far more than a building and clergy, as our new mission statement reflects: "We are a nurturing community for people of all ages who seek to know God, grow, and serve." St. Anselm's has been the site of baptisms, weddings, funerals, confirmations, and even ordinations. Of course, we've hosted numerous events, including folk masses, winter shelters, rummage sales, safety days, crab feeds, concerts, Easter egg hunts, bridge clubs, exercise classes, pet blessings, and art shows.



On Sunday, October 26th, we will welcome our Bishop, the Right Reverend Austin K. Rios, as presider, and the Very Rev. Tracey Lind, as preacher, as we celebrate 65 years of St. Anselm's and recommit ourselves to supporting the vitality of this parish. A special catered luncheon will follow our 10 a.m. service.

St. Anselm's Episcopal Church: Financial Planning for 2026

In 2024, as St. Anselm's emerged from a period of significant transition, we ran an operating deficit of about \$34,000. In 2025, the Vestry budgeted for an operating deficit of about \$22,000; although we may perform slightly better than that, it is unlikely we will break even this year.

A prudent budget, of course, would break even or generate a surplus. At the same time, we are eager to invest in personnel and programs to maintain vibrant community life while we sustain core spending to keep operations running smoothly and sustain well-functioning buildings and grounds. This brief narrative describes how St. Anselm's spends and raises money each year and is intended to provide context for our 2026 Stewardship campaign.

For 2026, the Finance Committee is budgeting increases in several categories. The extent of St. Anselm's control over different types of spending varies. We can think about proposed spending increases in three categories:


Non-optional: Staff salaries per Diocesan guidelines, utilities and insurance costs.

Investments to deepen communal life and attract more parishioner engagement:


Increased investment in our music program, special events, and programs.

Investments to care for existing resources: Maintenance and modest upgrades to our buildings and physical plant, landscape "hardening" to reduce fire risk, renewed contribution to a Property Reserve.

In all, our initial estimate of spending for 2026 is \$376,000, with more detail shown below.



St. Anselm's revenues come primarily from annual pledges but are augmented by non-pledge giving, loose plate gifts, facility use fees and interest. To achieve a balanced budget yet invest more deeply in priority areas, the pledge target for our 2026 Stewardship campaign is \$326,000.



The 2026 pledge target of \$326,000 represents a substantial increase – almost 23% -- above the pledges we secured in 2025. However, St. Anselm's givers have stepped up in remarkable ways in the past and we are hopeful they will do so again this year. For example, total pledged revenue for 2025 was 40% above the level pledged in 2024. The number of pledging households also grew in 2025, another hopeful sign.

The expenses and revenues presented here are estimates subject to additional fine-tuning. At its November and December meetings, the Vestry will review results from this year's stewardship campaign along with updated spending estimates to establish a final 2026 budget. With strong support through the Stewardship campaign, we will be in a good position to make desired investments and balance the budget. If we fall short of the \$326,000 pledged revenue target, spending in the non-optional categories previously described may not be attainable.

I will offer a brief Q&A session on St. Anselm's financial position and 2026 budget after church on Sunday, October 12. All are urged to attend, ask questions and offer suggestions about how our community can effectively steward the rich resources with which we've been entrusted.




