From Rev. Will

This week, the Bay Area--and the world--are mourning the passing of the Very Reverend Alan Jones, who served as the Dean of Grace Cathedral from 1985 to 2009. Although my own working relationship with Alan at Grace was relatively short, I am heartbroken to lose him because our friend-ship continued after his retirement. Alan remained a steadfast mentor and supporter, and was always eager to meet to hear what I'd been up to and offer his advice.

While we are all saddened to lose Alan's presence from our daily lives, we also rejoice in the imprint he left behind on the world. To name a few of his gifts, he was a compelling homilist, and embraced liturgical and other offerings, like the Cathedral's beloved labyrinth brought from Chartres by Lauren Artress, that spoke to San Francisco without diluting or compromising the message of Christianity. He also carefully developed the Cathedral's physical plant, built a strong team of clergy and lay staff, and understood the essential role of fundraising in keeping the place going and growing.

Much of what Alan preached and achieved is traceable to the Community of the Resurrection in Mirfield, West Yorkshire, in England. Alan credited this extraordinary community, often referred to as "Mirfield" for short, with training him for the priesthood. Six Christian Socialist priests established this community in the 1890s, deciding for some reason that this unassuming village, 200 miles from London and full of strong Northern English accents and textile factories, was just right for what they had planned. When my husband Matt and I visited Mirfield on a quiet summer afternoon six years ago, we were both struck by the contemplative yet welcoming atmosphere on the grounds. "We welcome others to come, see, learn and share," the brothers of Mirfield write on their website.

Mirfield may be a contemplative monastic community, but they look outward as well. Mirfield was deeply involved in the struggle against apartheid, and today maintains ecumenical ties with the Romanian Orthodox Church and other institutions. In addition to Alan, we have known other friends, such as the Reverend Rick Fabian of St. Gregory's of Nyssa fame, who have gone to Mirfield. Bernard Mayes, a worker priest, journalist and activist who served as the founding chairman of NPR, and who introduced me to Matt, also attended Mirfield. (And Matt himself was eager for me to point out that this unassuming village has been put on the map in another way: by being the birthplace of actors Jodie Whittaker and Patrick Stewart, who have had top billing in his two most beloved shows, Doctor Who and Star Trek respectively.)

I believe Mirfield and its alumni have lessons for us here at St. Anselm's. The core vows taken at Mirfield are threefold. First, "stability," which according to the brothers, refers to staying with given situations and particular people rather than chopping and changing. Second, "obedience," which for

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From The Senior Warden

The Holidays are a very special time of the year for giving thanks for all we have, assessing what we accomplished and failed to do over the past year and, most importantly, setting new goals for the year ahead. It's a time of new beginnings, commitments and goal setting.

Looking forward to 2024, St. Anselm's has welcomed Rev. Will Scott as our priest through Lent and perhaps beyond. During this time, we will all get to know Rev. Will better and he will have a chance to familiarize himself with us as individuals and with the work of our congregation. Rev. Will was Associate Rector 2020-2023 at Christ Episcopal Church in Alameda and has served various leadership roles as well as local congregational since his graduation from the Virginia Theological Seminary in 2004. We look forward to Rev. Will starting us off in 2024 with new visions and ideas for the year ahead.

2023 was a challenging year for our St Anselm's family and while we accomplished a great deal, we also shared frustrations that continue to be addressed. The operational improvements needed are resolved or will be in the next few months. These include returning to our pre-pandemic system for counting and handling of finances. We addressed facility maintenance issues that had long been in need by repaving the parking lot, initiating fire mitigation and land-scape beautification. We converted the lease we held for the cell tower to a buyout of over \$350,000 which we have invested in government backed CDs. We welcomed John Powers as our Treasurer and Margaret Wolfe as our new Office Administrator who replaced retiring Cathy Witkay.

In 2023 St. Anselm's reached out to the community with several new events such as the Lamorinda Safety Fair. We invited the community to bring their pets to our annual blessing of the animals and we are planning more such community events in 2024. Our congregation hosted homeless families in transition through the Winter Nights program. Our efforts for Trinity Center included the return of our Annual Dinner and Auction event that raised approximately \$45k for Trinity Center. "Thank You" to the many, many people who put in time, talent and financial support as we moved ahead in 2023 with new community involvement and our commitments to outreach

As your Sr. Warden I will do all that is possible to make St. Anselm's stronger before retiring from the Vestry later this year. I look forward to serving our community knowing that we are guided by the love of God and committed to serve Him in every way possible in the year ahead.

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Vestry Meeting Update

The Vestry met three times in December and January, focusing on next steps related to clergy and staff transitions as well as regular church business.

On December 4 we continued to discuss the forces and factors that contributed to Rev. Stephen Siptroth's short tenure as St. Anselm's Rector. We identified three contributing categories: interpersonal concerns; business process and governance concerns; and factors outside of the immediate control of our congregation and Vestry. We began to identify potential remedies, many of which are already in the works:

- -Upping our willingness to be open; greater attention to being warm and welcoming to all
- -Adjusting some business and decision-making processes, and ensuring that the full Vestry understands those processes
- -Clarifying the governance role of the Vestry
- -Considering outside mediation to help us navigate interpersonal dynamics and/or resistance to change

On December 18 we focused primarily on regular church business. Discussion topics and decisions included:


- -Review of Quarter 3 2023 financials and discussion of a proposed 2024 budget
- -Discussion of options related to Vestry member changes and elections, led by a Nominating Committee made up of Elisabeth Ward, Marty Fischer, Neva Flaherty and Chris Young
- -Updates and recommendations regarding financial management changes that are needed in order to bring us into alignment with recommended best practices
- -A decision to hold over the spending we had budgeted for 2023 Outreach spending until 2024, when we will engage in a process to review and refresh our Outreach priorities
- -Plans to engage Rev. Will Scott as a supply priest in January
- -Regular updates from committees and commissions

On January 15, during our regularly scheduled monthly Vestry meeting, our discussion topics and decisions included:

- -A final review of the 2024 budget
- -Deliberations and a decision to hire Rev. Audrey Miskelley, a local Episcopal priest who specializes in transition and church healing work, as a part-time external consultant beginning February 1. Rev. Audrey will engage in a confidential listening process through which we expect to gain a fuller understanding of the rift that led to Stephen's resignation and identify a course of action that will help move our community forward with healing and reconciliation.
- -Updates on office operations; an initial review of opportunities for Vestry members to assume certain administrative responsibilities; and a decision to establish a 3-month consulting relationship with Cathy Witkay to ensure that bookkeeping responsibilities are handled while office and financial oversight transitions continue.
- -Institution of a policy that all checks, regardless of amount, will now require two Vestry signatures and identification of Vestry members to serve as bank account managers and/or check signers.
- -A decision to hold a congregational meeting on February 4
- -A decision to continue Rev. Will's role as a long-term supply priest through the end of March (and Easter)
